



Bad Bills that became LAWS

AJR 10 (Brownley) *CHAPTERED*

Promotes programs which are authorized to refer minor girls to abortion clinics. Supports the school-based health center program, an appropriation by Congress to fund this program, policies that include school-based health centers as a partner in creating a medical home for all children, and the inclusion of school-based health centers in the reauthorization of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

AB 6 (Fuentes) *CHAPTERED*

Abolishes the state's requirement that food stamp applicants be fingerprinted.

AB 401 (Ammiano) *CHAPTERED*

Dramatically restricts the number of charter schools allowed in California. Imposes an unnecessary limit on charter schools that may exist in California by capping the number at 1,450 by 2017 and makes it more difficult to establish a charter school by altering the application process.

AB 433 (Lowenthal) *CHAPTERED*

Makes it easier for out-of-state persons, who were born in California and who have undergone a sex change operation, to obtain a new birth certificate that reflects their new name and "gender."

AB 499 (Atkins) *CHAPTERED*

Allows children who are 12 and older to seek medical care to prevent sexually transmitted infections without parental consent, including vaccinations against human papillomavirus, or HPV.

AB 604 (Skinner) *CHAPTERED*

Allows the Department of Public Health to authorize a needle-exchange program in any city or county it determines that conditions exist for rapid spread of HIV, viral hepatitis or other potentially deadly infections.

AB 620 (Block) *CHAPTERED*

Requests CSU, the California Community Colleges Board of Governors and UC Board of Regents to take certain actions related to data collection, campus policies and services, and training programs related to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender students, faculty and staff. Expands the term "gender" to include "gender identity" and "gender expression". Encourages the Legislative Analyst to assess and publish best practices to improve the quality of life for LGBT students, faculty, and staff.

AB 641 (Feuer) *CHAPTERED*

Extends to same-sex spouses and registered domestic partners the existing asset protections granted to spouses of applicants for, and recipients of, Medi-Cal home and facility care benefits.

AB 673 (J. Perez) *CHAPTERED*

Expands state government activities and responsibilities by mandating that the Office of Multicultural Health perform various duties on behalf of the Department of Public Health and the Department of Health Care Services with respect to the state's LGBT communities.

AB 887 (Atkins) *CHAPTERED*

Clarifies that the existing state protections from gender discrimination also include a person's "gender identity and gender-related appearance and behavior whether or not stereotypically associated with the person's assigned sex at birth."

AB 1349 (Hill) *CHAPTERED*

Denies biological fathers the right to equal responsibility to support the child as well as equal right to custody of the child by allowing a third party to challenge a voluntary declaration of paternity.



SB 41 (Yee) CHAPTERED

Permits, until January 1, 2015, a pharmacist or physician to furnish or sell up to 30 needles or syringes at a time to an individual 18 years of age or older without a prescription and without a permit from a city or county.

SB 48 (Leno) CHAPTERED

Requires California schools to teach about the contributions to history of gay, lesbian and transgender Americans.

SB 117 (Kehoe) CHAPTERED

Prohibits state agencies be prohibited from entering contracts for goods or services worth \$100,000 or more with companies who, in the provision of benefits, discriminates based on the gender or sexual orientation of the spouses or domestic partners.

SB 182 (Corbett) CHAPTERED

Expands the gathering of demographic data on judges to include the collection and release of data relative to gender identity and sexual orientation.

SB 651 (Leno) CHAPTERED

Eliminates the requirement that a couple live together to become domestic partners, allows confidential registration of a domestic partnership, allows confidential registration of a domestic partnership and lets someone under the age of 18 enter into a domestic partnership with parental consent or a court order.

SB 757 (Ted Lieu) CHAPTERED

Provides that every group health care service plan contract and group health insurance policy marketed, issued, or delivered to a California resident is subject to the requirements to provide coverage for registered domestic partners that are equal to the coverage provided to spouses, notwithstanding any other provision of law.

SB 930 (Evans) CHAPTERED

This bill undermines the anti-fraud policies governing the In-Home Support Services (IHSS) program. Repeals requirements that IHSS recipients provide fingerprint images and that provider timesheets include spaces for provider and recipient fingerprints; repeals the prohibition against providers using a post office box address to receive their paychecks

AB 1505 (Pan) CHAPTERED

Will make California veterans, who were discharged solely due to their sexual orientation under DADT, eligible for any state veteran benefits. These benefits may include tuition fee waivers, home-loan eligibility, property tax exemptions, burial in a veteran's cemetery, free or reduced fees for license plates, and reductions or waivers for business and recreational passes and licenses.

AB 1527 (Portantino) CHAPTERED

This bill extends the open carry ban on handguns to long guns.

AB 1856 (Ammiano) CHAPTERED

Would require that licensed foster parents and group-home administrators receive LGBT sensitivity training and that foster children have the right to foster parents who have such training.

AB 1960 (Dickinson) CHAPTERED

Would require the Department of General Services to include the level of participation in certain contracts by LGBT-owned businesses in a report they currently produce on minority-owned businesses. One purpose of such a bill is to reinforce in law LGBT persons as official "minorities," advancing a "protected class" status.

AB 2109 (Pan) CHAPTERED

Undermines parental decisions by requiring parents receive a "doctor's note" stating they have been given medical information about the pros and cons of vaccinations if they chose not to vaccinate; presumes that parents are incapable or unwilling to make an informed decision in the best interest of their child without the oversight of a state-licensed medical professional.



SB 1338 / SB 623 (Kehoe) DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines *Language Reintroduced in SB 623*****

CHAPTERED

Current law allows only physicians or surgeons, with valid licenses, to provide surgical abortions. SB 1338 would allow licensed nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and certified midwives to perform or assist in abortions done by medication or aspiration (suction) techniques.

SB 1221 (Lieu) CHAPTERED

Makes it illegal to hunt bears or bobcats with dogs.

SB 1234 (De León & Steinberg) CHAPTERED

Create a state run retirement plan by forcing businesses to offer an employer-sponsored retirement plan or participate in a state sponsored retirement savings program for private sector employees.

SJR 10 (De León) - CHAPTERED

Memorializes Congress to reinstate the federal assault weapons ban, to stem the tide of firearms into Mexico, ignoring "Fast and Furious" controversy regarding Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms shipping of guns south of US borders.

VETOED

AB 101 (J. Perez) VETOED

Allows child care workers, including family members, to unionize.

AB 532 (V. Manuel Perez) VETOED

Eliminates the requirement that English language learner students be tested in English.

SB 416 (Kehoe) VETOED

Mandates that appropriate voluntary self-identification information pertaining to sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression be included in the questions asked by the California Health Interview Survey, which is conducted by the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research.

SB 747 (Kehoe) VETOED

Orders doctors, nurses and other licensed health care professionals to take a brief "continuing education" course on how to treat and care for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered persons.

AB 889 (Ammiano & V. Manuel Perez) VETOED

Places an enormous burden on small and family run businesses by requiring business owners and private individuals (who are independently employed, such as a family care giver) to provide paid vacation and workers comp coverage for domestic workers.

AB 1657 (Wieckowski) VETOED

This would add a \$1 penalty to every conviction for a moving violation under local and state traffic laws. The penalty would be transferred to the spinal cord injury research fund within the University of California. These funds will be used by the Roman Reed Spinal Cord Injury Foundation, which strongly supports embryonic stem-cell research (ESCR), a morally questionable form of research that necessitates the loss of preborn life.

SB 1476 (Leno) VETOED

SB 1476 would provide that a child may have more than two parent-child relationships and would allow a court to find that a child may have two parental relationships outside the biological father – based on the best interests of the child.



AB 350 (Solario) *Passed in the Assembly, DIED in the Senate*

Requires any "successor" contractor to retain the employees of the former contractor - regardless of an employee's unsatisfactory performance.

AB 360 (Brownley) *DIED on Assembly Concurrence*

Hampers charter schools by making their employees conform to conflict of interest codes of the Political Reform Act instead of conforming to the conflict of interest codes of nonprofit organizations.

AB 400 (Ma) *DIED in Assembly Appropriations*

Mandates employers to provide paid sick days.

AB 625 (Ammiano) *DIED in Assembly*

Eases the consequences for sex offenders by ending the requirement that all offenders are required to register as sex offenders for life; creates a system of "tiered" registration depending on the offense and risk assessment.

AB 669 (Monning) *DIED in Assembly Revenue and Taxation*

Imposes a new tax of 1 cent per fluid ounce for sodas and sweet drinks.

AB 727 (Mitchell) *DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines*

Curtails Californians' freedom by limiting the choices available to them when purchasing items from vending machines or cafeterias in state-operated facilities by mandating that 50% of the products meet a certain nutritional value – enter the food police!

AB 828 (Swanson) *DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines*

Undermines welfare reform by allowing convicted drug felons to collect Food Stamps.

AB 1167 (Fong) *DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines*

Creates the "California Interagency Council on Homelessness". In the light of the ongoing budget deficit, the last thing that California should be doing is increasing spending or growing the size and scope of government. This bill does both.

AB 1326 (Furutani) *DIED in Assembly Revenue and Taxation*

Imposes a 12.5% oil and gas severance tax, which would be passed along to consumers. California already taxes every barrel of crude while it is still in the ground through an ad valorem property tax assessed on all estimated oil reserves, one of only three states to do so.

AB 1439 (Alejo) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Increases the cost of doing business on CA employers by annually indexing the minimum wage rate upwards according to the percentage of inflation (even during an economic downturn).

AB 1539 (Hayashi) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Would require the Department of Motor Vehicles, in consultation with the California Department of Education (CDE), to design and make available license plates that promote the state's policy that prohibits "discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying based on actual or perceived characteristics and disability, gender, gender identity, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics." Proceeds would be used by the CDE to fund state or local anti-bullying programs administered by the department or through grants to local school districts.

AB 1543 (Alejo) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Increases the cost of contracting with the state and reinstates a requirement (previously banned by California courts) that prohibits contracting with those businesses that use component parts from other countries.



AB 1678 (Monning) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

More food police activity – this bill violates Californian’s ability to make their own choices by banning food trucks from within 1500 feet of schools (sex offenders are banned 2000 feet from schools).

AB 1746 (Williams) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Even more from the food police – this limits the free choices that Californians have by banning *Gatorade* from middle and high schools or any "electrolyte" drink that has over 30 grams of sugar per serving.

AB 1808 (Williams) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Interferes with the private sector by subjecting private businesses to “petitions of recognition” from public employee unions.

AB 1988 (Davis) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Redefines the basic definition for English language learners, and increase costs for schools to test English language learners and meet any needs for limited English learners.

AB 2203 (V. Manuel Perez) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Makes it mandatory for children 5 years of age to attend school on a “full-time” basis. Essentially requiring 5 year olds to attend a full-day Kindergarten and removing the option.

AB 2217 (Pan) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Discourages businesses from locating a call center in California by requiring the business to require the service representative who makes a telephone call to a California customer to identify the location of the call center.

AB 1500 & 1501- (J. Perez) *DIED in Senate*

Nullifies a budget agreement reached in 2010 that provides companies a choice of how to calculate their business liability; uses these tax revenues to fund college scholarships for middle class students. Deters economic growth and could reduce thousands of jobs.

AB 1897 (Campos) *DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines*

Increases the cost of development and creates project delays by *requiring* local governments’ general plans incorporate concepts related to “healthy food access” and “urban agriculture.”

AB 1999 (Brownley) *DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines*

Expands the Fair Employment and Housing Act to include a “protected classification” for any person who is, who will be, or who is perceived as a family caregiver, which will result in endless litigation. To determine discrimination on the basis of what “familial status” means will also unnecessarily restrict employers’ ability to make personnel decisions.

AB 2312 (Ammiano) *DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines*

Sets up a weak regulatory regime for medical marijuana that will allow felons to run for-profit medical marijuana businesses and requires (with some exceptions) medical marijuana dispensaries to be sited at the rate of one dispensary per 50,000 residents.

AB 2424 (Portantino) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Increases the cost of timber production by changing the state’s forestry goals to give equal consideration to “public need” when reviewing forestry operations, making a mockery of private property rights, spawning litigation, and jeopardizing employment and economic opportunity in a state already suffering from high unemployment and rural poverty.

AB 2517 (Eng) *DIED in Assembly*

Allows employees to file liens on an employer’s property for any unproven wage claims.

SB 249 (Yee) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

This bill would define “detachable magazine” for this purpose to mean any ammunition feeding device that can be removed from the firearm without disassembly of the firearm action, and to include a magazine that may be detached from the firearm by depressing a button on the firearm either with the finger or by use of a tool or a bullet.



SB 432 (De León) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Requires California hotels to use fitted sheets on all beds and provide extension handles for all tools—costing the lodging industry \$30- \$50 million.

SB 568 (Lowenthal) *DIED in Assembly*

Threatens thousands of manufacturing jobs within the state by prohibiting all food vendors from using foam food service containers.

SB 653 (Steinberg) *DIED in Senate*

In addition to our current federal and state income tax, this bill authorizes local governments to impose income taxes, vehicle taxes, oil excise taxes, etc.

SB 810 (Leno) *DIED in Senate*

Would enact a California-style "Obama-care".

SB 950 (Alquist) *DIED in Senate pursuant to committee deadlines*

Forces taxpayers to overpay their taxes in order to avoid severe penalties.

SB 969 (Vargas) *DIED in Assembly pursuant to committee deadlines*

Creates unnecessary oversight and overregulation of the pet grooming industry. Creates the "Pet Grooming Act" and establishes the "California Pet Grooming Council". This Council shall issue a certificate of certification to a pet groomer or pet bather, and brusher.

SB 1528 (Steinberg) *DIED in Assembly*

Artificially inflates medical damage awards in personal injury cases by allowing an injured party to recover expenses never actually incurred- increases legal costs, rates for auto, health insurance.
